I greatly appreciated worshipping with my brothers and sisters in India. My first year at the Women's Conference, the pastor's wives taught me a dance to a popular praise song, "Rajah." I have to admit I had a blast even though I had not danced for years and felt a bit awkward. It became one of my favorite memories of my time in India.

When I returned the following year, my Indian Sisters remembered the fun we had and quickly pulled me outside during a break to dance with them. While some of the women sang and clapped a beat, others taught me dance steps to a new song. It was hot, well over 100 degrees and although I was moving, I was not feeling the song... just the heat!! I took a break. Yet my sisters continued to sing and dance their hearts out. The interpreter came out and told me the words to the song. "God is faithful, in the storm, God is faithful."

I watched the women sing and dance with joy claiming from their inner being that God is faithful. Their lives were not easy. They worked hard and struggled to care for family and the church community while their husbands ministered. But as they danced I remembered the stories they shared earlier that day about the past year. One woman saw God heal when she prayed. God provided food for one sister's congregation to share with the community each week after worship. Through PPMI, God supplied sewing machines so they could use for their family, a drill pump so a congregation and community could have water, and bikes for transportation and outreach. God provided a child for one of the couples. A new church was started and windows for a church building were donated. From one year to the next I could see that the pastor's wives were joining with their husbands in ministry more often. They were bonding as a group of women and beginning to support each other between conferences. They had a mentor and coach through Sister Sumatha Thalathoti and were blossoming as leaders and women of prayer. "God is faithful, God is faithful," they sang. And I knew it was so as I rejoined the dance.

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Another example of being on fire for God is a small family in a village near Guntur. A young man, his wife, and his mom were Hindu. The mom had a disease in her leg and didn't have the money to pay for more surgery. She finally had no other option, and went to the pastor to pray for her. She was miraculously healed. Once his mom converted to Christianity, him and his wife did as well. The pastor changed their names to Naomi, Ruth, and Boaz. Boaz then became the elder of the church. When I was talking with his wife, we learned that not only did she have a one year old baby, she was also 18. I was shocked because I knew that some kids get married young but this is the first time I met a young couple that already had a baby. It opened my eyes to how she's 18, has a kid, and is growing in the Lord, yet here I am, the same age, and complain about getting up for Sunday school. It was really evident that the Lord is working in the lives of the young people there.

Last year, the PPMI team was fortunate to have my second cousin, Gideon, tag along. He helped out a lot with pictures, phone calls, getting stuff done, and translating when we needed it. This year we had Gideon, and my other second cousin Rohan along with us. I had a great time hanging

out with them

and they soon became as close as brothers to me. Even though the team probably got annoyed of us joking around all the time, it was truly a blessing to see two young men interested in learning more about God and helping us with what we needed.

This trip was honestly the best trip I've been on and if you know me, you know I've been on a lot of trips. I got in touch with my Indian culture and fell more in love with it then before. The trip also opened my eyes to the young people in the church and how important it is to encourage the young people to have a voice and share their talents in church. The adults are teaching the young adults to keep God as their foundation, so that once they grow up, they will be able to lay down the foundations for generations to come.

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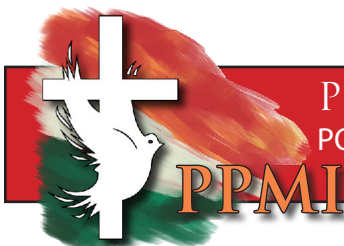
